Focus on... PARS Hong Kong



With the implementation of the new Kindergarten Education Curriculum Guideline (KGECG) launched in 2017 by the Hong Kong Education Bureau, many kindergartens are exploring how to integrate free play in their settings. Playright is supporting this development with their "Seed School Training Program" (SSTP). 11 kindergartens have been selected to be seed schools and early childhood educators are being empowered with PARS playwork training to

demonstrate PARS skills and techniques during free playtime sessions. In research conducted by Early Childhood Education Department of the Education University of Hong Kong, the training program was found to be significantly effective in several aspects, including framing free play, empowering teachers to set up free play environments and allowing children more space and time to direct play and make their own decisions. The SSTP has also gained positive feedback from the Principals and teachers of the participating seed schools, as PARS provides a common language for them to educate parents and share practice with colleagues and the wider population of ECE teachers. The training program has also been applied to special child care settings, and it is predicted that a quarter of special child care centres in Hong Kong will have regular free playtime by 2020.
